Unbreakable

What a promise means to us changes throughout our lives. When we were in elementary school the greatest promise pledge we could think of was "cross my heart, hope to die, stick a needle in my eye." We'd think, woah, that kid must be serious about this. With maturity, comes a higher promise standard (thankfully). We start to see promises as unbreakable words. We also, obviously, know better than to think any sinful human can actually perfectly uphold every promise they make every time they make it. We begin to understand that the "unbreakable words" of a promise actually mean "I'll try my best not to break it, if circumstances allow."

Sometimes, we misunderstand that God's promises don't work that way,

though. We try to apply the life lessons we've learned from the broken world around us to help us understand God instead of using God's lessons to understand the world around us. God's promises are true and 100% certain of not being broken. God has never broken a single promise. And as sinful, broken humans ourselves, we can't even comprehend how that works. We want to believe it, but it seems too good to be true. We spend our time hoping it's true, but in the back of our minds we wonder when the other shoe will drop.

"For no matter how many promises God has made, they are "Yes" in Christ. And so through him the "Amen" is spoken by us to the glory of God."-2 Corinthians 1:20

We have a sure and certain hope in the God who is real and who keeps His promises. No heart crossing or needles in the eye necessary.



Christmastime is a time when almost everyone tends to get in the gifting mood. We get gifts for people for a myriad of reasons including wanting them to feel loved and thought about and to show our appreciation for them. Sometimes we get obligatory gifts for people because they gave one to us and we'd hate to look like we didn't care too. We even give gifts to our package carriers because we feel guilty about the

amount of work they have to do around the holidays (and often in crummy weather). But did you ever consider that regardless of the reasons for our gifts, we can still point our families and others to God as we go? We can use gifting to talk about God and shape faith as we are charged to do in Deuteronomy 6:6-7:

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. These commandments that I give you today are to be on your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the way, when you lie down and when you get up."

Here are some ideas for how we can talk about faith and point our families to God as you gift this season:

> Giving Gifts—How do you pick out which gift you will give someone? Do you fly by the seat of your pants? Plan for months? Seek out anything they've said they wanted? Look at gift idea lists online? Resign yourself to gift cards for everyone? Think and talk about how your gifts can point others to Jesus as you choose what to give. There are lots of ways that gifts can teach and shape and point, but we have to take time to consider and be intentional to be a light to others.

Getting Gifts—

Receiving gifts can be awesome when someone gets you exactly what you were wanting, but it can also be awkward when someone gets you a dud of a gift. Talk about how we can respond with genuine gratitude and reflect Christ to our

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gift givers, regardless of the gift received.

Why Gifts?—Gift giving in conjunction with Christmas began as a reminder of the gold, frankincense and myrrh that the magi brought to Jesus. The three gifts had a spiritual meaning: gold as a symbol of kingship on earth, frankincense as a symbol of deity, and myrrh (an embalming oil) as a symbol of death. Talk as a family about why you give gifts to each other. Maybe you've never stopped to consider this before but it would be a great time to start. What do the gifts we give each other have to do with Jesus?

Emphasis—Sometimes it's easy for us and our children to get caught up in gifting at Christmas that it becomes our emphasis. Talk about what the most important part of Christmas is as a family. (Hint: it's not gifts, philanthropy or even family.) How can your family make sure to emphasize what's important this Christmas season?

Continue to share the joy of Christ through giving and receiving Christmas gifts and as you gift, consider how through the gifts, we can share Jesus with one another.

I came to the Lutheran expression of the Christian (catholic) faith after nearly twenty years following Jesus in other contexts. All brought their own color and weight to the gospel proclamation. In 1999, when I began investigating what made Lutherans Lutheran, I quickly found that one of the great joys of the church of the Augsburg Confession was the music. For a couple reasons: the music itself, and what the



music was "employed" to do. Doctor
Luther himself said that music was
second only to theology in the ranking of
learning. And so, he purposed early on,
perhaps even before the Ninety-Five
Theses were hammered on the
University Church doors at Wittenberg,
that music would be the servant of Holy
Scripture in bringing the heart-exalting,
mind-enriching truths of the
Reformation to those who loved the
Lamb.

A few years ago, I happened on a wonderful collection of hymns from the entire history of the Lutheran Church and began to listen to and learn the joys of what I had "missed". One hymn, from the pen of my favorite Lutheran hymn writer, the 18th century pastor Paul Gerhardt, finds rest in the "Christmas" section of the Lutheran Service Book.

The title of this meditation comes from #360 in the Lutheran Service Book. Gerhardt's lovely "All My Heart Again Rejoices" is set to the melody of Johann Cruger, Gerhardt's contemporary. Our gifted editor has prompted us with the word "promise" for December. And although when this Newsletter finds you, we will still be in the throes of Advent, I give you permission to cheat and jump into the Christmas section of the LSB. And there I would call you to #360, verse 5.

"Softly from His lowly manger
Jesus calls
One and all,
'You are safe from danger.
Children from the sins that grieve you
You are freed;
All you need
I will surely give you.'"

Just one of many verses, but the one that best expresses to me that my Savior



promises and delivers what only He can give. In the maddening rush of all that the world claims is the "true meaning of Christmas," remember this my brothers and sisters in Christ: He, the Mighty Savior, says to each one, "All You Need I Will Surely Give You."

I PLEDGE ALLEGIANCE

A pledge is a promise. Over the past few years more and more United States citizens are refusing to publically pledge, or promise their allegiance to the flag and to the republic for which it stands. Why? For any number of reasons. Some have said it was because they do not believe that we are "one nation under



God..." One nation? Yes! Under God? No! People will always have their convictions for which they are willing to take their stand.

Where should the Church of Jesus Christ take its stand? Christians are citizens in two distinct kingdoms. Martin Luther wrote about there being two kingdoms. The Kingdom of the Left and the Kingdom of the Right. The Kingdom of the Left is concerned with earthly governments and their use of power to preserve order and to protect its citizens. The Kingdom of the Right is the realm of salvation, forgiveness, and living out our faith in ways that honor God and serve for the common good. Both realms, Left and Right, are God's gift to human-kind. (See Romans 13 and John 3:16)

We can, without fear of violating conscience, live in both kingdoms. However, what does the Christian do when the Kingdom of the Left decrees something that stands in opposition to the clear Word of God? Acts 5:29 states it most clearly, "We must obey God rather than man."

We pledge our allegiance to the One who first made a pledge to us. The promise of God came to us in a Bethlehem Manger. Wrapped in swaddling cloth, the infant, incarnate Son of God was here to carry out God's pledge to us. That meant suffering and dying and giving up His sinless life for our sin-filled lives. This He did for us and for our salvation being nailed to the Cross.

Many students in Christian Schools, after reciting the Pledge of Allegiance will also recite this pledge, I pledge allegiance to the cross of my Lord, Jesus Christ. And to the faith for which it stands, one Savior, eternal, with mercy and grace for all.

Our ultimate and eternal allegiance is pledged to Him who is the Savior of all. God's peace be with us.

bag with eight different food items; enough to last through the entire weekend. Through November 14th, an average of 62 bags have been filled each week.

A couple of "thank yous" are in order. First, the team would like to thank the anonymous couple who has once again purchased all the new backpacks for the student's use; this is a significant

expenditure. Secondly, the team wishes to thank the P-S FoodMart/Citco gas station at 500 Longfellow for donating 709 boxes of Pop-Tarts.

All of the food handed out is purchased from the Food Bank in Battle Creek at a cost of about 33% of wholesale prices. This allows us to greatly extend our purchasing abilities.

As always, the Backpack Team continues to thank and praise our Lord for all His grace, mercy and generosity in sustaining this program year after year. To Him be all glory and honor.

One of my favorite movies is *Hook*, with Robin Williams as an aging Peter Pan who is now part of corporate America. He has no recollection of Neverland, and no clue how to connect with his family; his children in particular.



"My word is my bond," is his constant mantra to his children, but he's never there for them. His "bond" is worthless; a promise not kept speaks more clearly than all the good intentions in the world.
