FAMILY FAITH LIFE

<u>List</u>

I have always been a list maker. Even before I was trying to remember so many things in my brain simultaneously. Even for those things I could remember without a list. I like making lists. I like seeing everything neatly on a piece of paper. And of course, depending on the list, I like crossing things off the list. (Who doesn't?)

Some lists are to-do lists, others are shopping lists, others are gift idea lists, prayer lists, address lists and the list of lists could go on and on. Some lists you'd love to be on and others you'd prefer not to be. But one type of list I really dislike is Santa's naughty/nice list. The mere mention of it makes me bristle. The naughty/nice list teaches that you have to "be good" (whatever that means) and if you are "good enough," then you will be rewarded with gifts. If you are "naughty," you will receive coal instead of gifts. I'm cringing just writing this.

The message of Jesus, in stark contrast, teaches something very different. It's a message of grace for those undeserving of anything good. It is a message that shows that we have a God who is giving us good gifts apart from anything that we do or don't do. It is not a message of punishment and reward; rather, it is a message of lavish goodness simply because of love. The Bible doesn't really talk about this in terms of a list, but it does talk about how this gift of forgiveness, life and salvation that Jesus offers lands our names in the Lamb's Book of Life. Now there's a list I love to be included on! Thanks be to God for this precious gift!



With the dawn of grocery delivery and online ordering for pickup, grocery shopping is becoming less common, but I don't foresee it going away as a regular part of everyday life anytime soon. Quick trips for milk, bread and forgotten ingredients will always remain. Being that this is a part of our ordinary lives, we can also seize these moments to talk about God and shape faith as we are charged to do in Deuteronomy 6:6-7:

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. These commandments that I give you today are to be on your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the way, when you lie down and when you get up."

Here are some ideas for how we can talk about faith and point our families to God while grocery shopping:

- Comparisons—As you compare products by brand, ingredient, price or what simply looks best, talk about all the criteria that we look at to "pick" things. Then talk about how over and over throughout Scripture God doesn't use the criteria that people use to choose His children, to appoint rulers, or to call people to a special task—God looks at the heart (1 Samuel 16).
- Who made that?—Depending on the age of your children, play a simple game of "who made that?" in the grocery store aisles. Talk about how God made foods

to nourish our bodies and He even gave ideas for ingredients and recipes to people too!

- Needs & Wants—You may need cereal for breakfast at your house, but do you need Cookie Crisp or Lucky Charms? Those might be wants. Use the aisles and the requests of your children (and yourself!) to discern between needs and wants. Talk about how God knows both our needs and our wants. He provides us with "everything we need to support this body and life" (Luther's Small Catechism) and sometimes gives us bonus blessings of our wants, too. How great is our God to provide us with all of our needs? How great is our God to also give us many of our wants? Talk about how we work hard to be able to buy things, but ultimately God is the Provider of those things, too.
- Shopping Carts—As you use your shopping cart to carry all of your finds through the store, talk about what we as Christians carry. What does it mean to be a carrier of each of these things? Why has God decided to utilize His children in these ways? How are we enabled to carry the things God has given us to carry? Is carrying the things of God a burden or a blessing? Why?

Next time you stop by the grocery store, don't forget you can use the time to chat about meaningful things of God and how they intersect with our shopping and our daily lives.




store. I could have a list of 3 things to get, and forget my list. Then, thinking I'll


