

# REDEEMER REFLECTION

#### **MUST I CONFESS?**

I must confess that there is a growing list of things that bug me. Maybe it is because I am getting older. Maybe it is because there is so much more going on in our world that bugs me. Maybe I am just overly sensitive to things that bug me. Whatever the reason for my increasing list of personal

irritations, I must confess that this confession concerning myself bugs me. I don't necessarily like being bugged so easily. It is a confession I make with no small degree of embarrassment.

A partial list of things that bug me would include people who drive 30 mph in a 45 mph zone; people who refuse to use turn signals; people who, while at the checkout, go back into the store because they forgot something thus making me wait for them to return; people who say "dude" way too much.

My list could go on for quite a while. However, as I read my own words about things that bug me, the "things" are not things at all but they are people. And I must confess that the thing that bugs me most is the smallness and the pettiness of those things that bug me. The most glaring omission from my list is me; specifically my own sin. That which should be tops on my list is noticeably absent. I am reminded of the words of our Savior who said in Matthew 7:3, "Why do you see the speck that is in your brother's eye, but do not notice the log that is in your own eye?"



Confession is crucial for who we are as children of God. That confession comes with two applications. The first is confession of our sins. Not the sins we see in others, but those we see in ourselves. (2nd use of the Law as the mirror). This confession comes from a deep seeded

understanding of who we are and what we do in sinful thoughts, words and deeds. "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness (1 John 1:9).

The second application has to do with our response to God's forgiveness. "Because, if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved" (Romans 10:9). We confess with our mouth what comes from the heart, that Jesus is Lord. That He is the One who gave His sinless life for my sinful life. The biggest bug in my life has been squashed under the nailed and pierced feet of the Savior.

I must confess that those little things on my list may still bug me, but in light of what Jesus has done for me, I look forward to my list becoming smaller and smaller as I draw closer to Him. Later dudes!

#### **FAMILY FAITH LIFE**

As we approach the time of year when the weather changes are in full swing—colder, warmer, then colder again—we tend to think about what's coming: winter. Some years in Michigan we get a little more "in between" fall weather than others. But us Michiganders have come to realize that we can't get too used to the fall. The in-between temperatures are shortlived. Our bodies and minds need to adjust quickly to the next season.

Deuteronomy 6:6-7 says, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. These commandments that I give you today are to be on your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the way, when you lie down and when you get up." Changing weather is another great time to talk about faith as you go about new rhythms of a new season. Here's some ideas that might help get your brain ready to talk!

• Changing Weather—Dropping temperatures remind us that the things in this world around us change all the time. Mother Nature often gets the blame for unwanted weather changes and the credit for the desired ones. But this might be the opportunity to correct yourself or your kids and talk about how Mother Nature isn't really a person, she doesn't control anything, and people talking about her as if she does is a slight toward our God who does. Talk about the Bible verses that say there are storehouses of snow (Job 38:22-30) and what those might be like, the ones that say God has

- treasuries of wind (Psalm 135:7) and how He might collect the wind in such a way, and how God gives rain to the earth (Job 5:10) and how He might decide when and where to do that. Wonder at our God who is over all of creation and all of the weather. And wonder at how confused people got that someone called Mother Nature could ever have more power over weather than our Mighty God.
- Wardrobe Changes—As we change out our shorts for sweaters, swimsuits for wool socks, and dig out the coats and snow boots, we can talk about how much we have to change in our lives. We change our clothes every day, we change our minds, we have to change out our wardrobes to fit the weather. But one thing we can be assured of is that God's nature, being, and promises do not change (Malachi 3:6). Talk about what it means to be ever-changing people with a changeless God—what do you think/feel about that, how does it comfort you, etc.?
- **Anticipation**—With the changing weather comes anticipation of things...we are excited for Thanksgiving and Christmas, we long for visits with grandparents and days off of school, we cannot wait for the thrill of the future: fill-in-the-blank. It seems we have more anticipation around this time of year for something. And as our families anticipate whatever it is they are looking forward to, we can point them to the thing that we as God's children get to anticipate most—eternity with God. Sometimes the things in this world that we look forward to don't work out, but we know that God has promised to bring us to the place He's prepared for us with Him because of what Christ has done for us on the cross. That's something to anticipate.



#### **CONFESSIONS OF A PARENT**

I look back on my parenting days and see a whole lot of mistakes. But I can also see the times when my husband and I made good, solid decisions that helped our children grow into the responsible, intelligent adults that they are. The biggest gift you can give each other as parents is the gift of forgiveness. You are NOT perfect, and never will be this side of heaven.

I can't give you the gift of perfection in parenting, but I can share some insights that may help you as you try to be Biblically strong parents who build security and confidence into your children's lives using the tools provided in God's Word.

The hardest part of being a parent is being the adult. Children need security and that comes from having someone who cares enough to confidently make

decisions for their good. Children will push back against these decisions or BOUNDARIES, but good parenting requires you as the adult (and loving parent) to stand your ground and not resort to arguing your position. You are the adult, and your children need to feel secure in your right to make those decisions for their safety and eminent good. Do not argue with your little ones! They need your firm stand to feel safe, without the panic they will feel when left to make unnecessary choices. You are the adult. Make the necessary choices for them.

Seing a parent means NO WAFFLING!
You are "the boss of them" when they are in your

home. God gave you the gift of children and the job is yours to do. Handle with



care, but don't abdicate your role as their parent and their guide. Respect is a key tool in your parenting toolbox. Children learn respect by learning to follow rules and listen to leadership, whether it be parent, teacher, policeman, or boss. NO WAFFLING earns that respect. Handle with love.

When making decisions and establishing rules, a key to success is being CALM. When a parent states a rule or a decision calmly and firmly, children are more likely to pay attention and follow through. Suggesting that your child do something makes them feel as if it's their decision to make, which often creates a panic within them to make a choice. Do not make the task or plan an option. There will be fun opportunities for them to make choices at another time. By stating a decision, "We'll get our p.j.s on

and then have a snack," the child can get right to the task without having to think about it or worry. If there's any argument, repeat the plan in a firmer voice and/or state, "This is what we're doing now."

Consistency is a key necessity in parenting. Stick-to-your-guns once you've established the rules that will work for your family. If you've waffled up until now, it's not too late to start. But be CONSISTENT as you begin. Children take comfort in routine. Too many



activities during the week, or weekends chocked full of activities and visits, can cause excessive stress and meltdowns in children, especially elementary

school age and younger. Make sure you save some time each week for just being family.

The most important tool in your parenting toolbox is love: yours and God's. You can be firm without being mean, and you can be loving



without forfeiting respect.
